



Legislative Session Opens With Emphasis on Renewable Energy

The 2006 Session of the Hawai'i State Legislature opened Wednesday, January 18, with a renewed focus on energy issues. Energy conservation and the development of renewable energy sources have been the goals of measures introduced over the years by Senator J. Kalani English, who says he welcomes the opportunity to promote statewide energy reform.

"Hawai'i's energy situation is critical," he said, "and we welcome the opportunity to partner with the state to turn things around. Our dependence on fossil fuels must be addressed. Hawai'i burns more oil to produce electricity than any other state – and that makes us dependent on forces beyond our control.

Energy reform has been a priority for me and for my committee for years."

Sen. English is Chair of the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment, and International Affairs. He has introduced legislation over the years aimed at reducing Hawai'i's dependence on fossil fuels, moving the state toward the use of renewable energy, creating incentives for private industry to develop alternative sources of energy; and calling for energy-efficient construction of new state buildings.

These ideas were all part of the administration's energy package, which was announced at a State Capitol news conference Jan. 12. Gov. Lingle thanked Sen. English, saying, "Sen. English has been involved in these issues for a long time. We appreciate you and your efforts on advising us as we put our energy package together."
